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#### **CLERGY COLUMN**

Catholic Massterclass

Brief review:

• Mass is an act of worship, a moment for us to come and express to God what He is worth to us. Our primary focus is on Him, not on ourselves.

• We worship on Sundays because of His command to keep the Sabbath holy. The Jews understood this to mean Saturdays, but the early Christians transferred the fulfillment of this commandment to Sundays, the day that Jesus rose from the dead. We worship on Sundays as an expression of obedience to this command, but also because this obedience will lead to our flourishing. It's not about us, but following God's commands leads us to become the people God created us to be. That's important.

This week, we're looking at the Mass as a sacrifice. To be sure, this is probably too big of a topic for just one session, but we'll do our best.

Mirriam-Webster Dictionary defines sacrifice as "an act of offering to a deity something precious". Ultimately, worship has this sense of sacrifice at its core - God is worth every sacrifice, every precious offering. Toward the beginning of Genesis, we're told that the offering most favorable to God was the offering made by Abel from among the "best firstlings" of his flock. He offered something precious to God in worship and it was acceptable to the Lord.

Later on, while the pattern of sin continues to grow in the world, God establishes a system of worship (we'll talk more about the structure next week), which has at its heart the sacrifice of animals and other offerings. There is something about these animal sacrifices that bring atonement for sin - they repair, imperfectly and temporarily, the damage caused by sin and restore the family relationship (covenant) between the people and God. The animal sacrifices could be called "ritualized self-offering", which means the person offering the animal in sacrifice is symbolically offering himself to God in sacrifice. We could imagine how precious an offering this may have been, since it was symbolic of offering one's own life to God. These sacrifices are so clearly at the heart of the people's relationship with God in the Old Testament - they included animal sacrifices (bloody) and sacrifices of bread/grain (unbloody).

When Jesus came along, He instituted the New Covenant sacrifice at the Last Supper. With the bread and the chalice of wine, He no longer symbolically offered Himself to the Father: "This is my body, which will be given up for you. ... This is the chalice of my blood, which will be poured out for you." He made a connection between the Eucharist and the Crucifixion that would take place the next day. The Crucifixion was a bloody self-sacrifice offered to the Father in obedience and worship, while the Eucharist is the unbloody self-sacrifice offered to the Father in union with the Crucifixion. When He said, "Do this in memory of me," his disciples understood that this unbloody sacrifice was to be offered as the sacrifice of the New Covenant, a new memorial ritual to be offered. This time, however, there is no mere symbolic offering, but the same self-offering of Jesus on the cross and at the Last Supper in an unbloody way. When the priest offers the Mass, he is doing so in the Person of Christ, which means it is Jesus acting through and in him. Jesus transports us back to the Last Supper and to the Cross all at one moment where we take part in His self-offering to the Father. Hebrews chapters 9 & 10 help us to see that the sacrifice of Jesus is eternal, perpetual, so the Mass is our way of participating in that one sacrifice.

"But rather, love your enemies and do good to them, and lend without expecting anything back..." - LUKE 6:35

Easier said than done, right? But, if we are to imitate Christ, most of us need to practice mercy and compassion more frequently. Praying for our enemies doesn't change them, it changes us. Mercy and compassion will keep us on the path to holiness.

In Mark 8:22-26, while Jesus was in Bethsaida, some people brought him a blind man and begged Jesus to touch him. Jesus took the blind man by the hand and led him out of the village. He then put saliva on his eyes and laid His hands on him and asked the blind man if he could see anything. The blind man said he could see people, but they looked like walking trees. Jesus laid his hands on him again and the blind man's sight was restored.

The love of Jesus is not just for one act or moment. He is the God of abundance; He always has more healing for you. He never tires revisiting the area of your life He has already touched. He desires to lay His hands where we need Him to the most so He may completely restore you with His healing touch.
