CLERGY COLUMN

Happy Lord's Day!

Today's focus is a bit controversial, although it doesn't need to be, so I'll begin by restating something I mentioned back at the beginning of our Massterclass: the main purpose of the Mass is worship of God, which means our focus during Mass ought to be on God. Worship is an action that forgets about "me" and looks entirely to the one I'm worshiping. This is an essential reality for us to remember if we are going to approach our time at Mass with the appropriate disposition.

What is also incredibly important to remember is the role of the priest at Mass. The priest is acting in the person of Christ, who is our head. What does Christ do on earth? He offers Himself in sacrifice to the Father as an act of worship. He stands between God and man, giving Himself both to God in sacrifice and to humanity in covenant communion, all united in the Eucharist and the Cross. This is the mystery we enter into at every Mass, and it defines the priest's role: to stand in the person of Christ, offering the sacrifice on behalf of the people of God, which is the Church.

This idea has its origins even in Jewish worship in the Jerusalem Temple. The people would bring their offerings to the priests, who would then offer them to God on behalf of the people. The people, meanwhile, would spiritually offer those gifts in union with the physical offering of the priests. Everything was focused on giving to God what he had requested.

Because the priest is offering sacrifice to the Father on behalf of the people, it makes sense that his posture reflects that reality. Just as Christ turned His face toward the Father in His self-offering, the priest at Mass turns with the people toward the Lord. This posture—of both priest and people facing the same direction—has traditionally been called *ad orientem*, "toward the east." Liturgical worship was historically oriented to the east as a sign of awaiting the Lord's return: "For as lightning comes from the east and shines as far as the west, so will the coming of the Son of Man be" (Matthew 24:27). Today, even if we are not geographically facing east, we face a common direction—what the Church calls liturgical east—toward the Lord.

I know this may be confusing for many of us. Many from our parishes grew up at a time when the priest "had his back to us" and the Mass was offered in a language most didn't understand—Latin. Because the Mass wasn't explained very well, it often felt inaccessible. Then, when priests began to celebrate *versus populum*—facing the people—and the language changed to the vernacular, it seemed like the Mass finally made sense. But unfortunately, the deeper meaning of the Mass was still not explained well, which led many to think of it more as a communal gathering than an act of divine worship.

It's important to know that the Church never mandated that priests face the people; it merely permitted it. In recent years, many priests—especially younger ones—have come to appreciate *ad orientem* because of the clarity it brings: the priest is not speaking to the people; he is leading them in offering worship to God.

Today, we will offer Mass *ad orientem*—facing the same direction together, toward the Lord. I had expressed to Bishop Cozzens my desire to adopt this posture more permanently, but he has asked that we limit its use to this one occasion for now, and I will honor his request. I hope this experience helps us all to reflect more deeply on the nature of the Mass as a sacrifice offered to God.
